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A Message from the Director

The Global Labour Research Centre (GLRC) at York University is very pleased to welcome you to our fourth annual International Graduate Student Symposium. The symposium showcases graduate student research on a wide range of issues related to the study of work and labour in a global context, and offers an interdisciplinary forum for graduate students and post-doctoral fellows to share their research in a collaborative environment.



In addition to panels on a broad array of topics, this year's symposium features a keynote lecture—the John Eleen Annual Lecture in Global Labour— "Reclamation: Feminism, Labour and the (Un)Learning of (Radical) History" with Kiké Roach. Her talk will focus on past and contemporary manifestations of feminist and anti-racist struggles for economic justice, human rights and an end to violence, and asks "What do we need to reclaim to make a better world?"

RECLAMATION:

FEMINISM, LABOUR AND THE (UN)LEARNING OF (RADICAL) HISTORY

Kiké Roach

Ryerson University - Unifor National Chair in Social Justice and Democracy

Over the past decade, dynamic and visible social movements have brought many to the streets in protest: Black Lives Matter, Idle No More, #MeToo, the Women's March, the Fight for \$15 and Fairness. Yet while these movements have garnered national and international attention and action, deep, vital, transformational change remains elusive.

As income inequality and racial and xenophobic tensions rise, and sexual violence persists, modest reforms and symbolic gestures are cast as progress while an emboldened rightwing systematically chips away at gains of the past.

The narratives and core philosophies of Black and feminist struggles too often continue to be distorted, hollowed out, or co-opted. Have we heeded the wisdom of the past and learned the lesson that to transform the world, we would have to start by transforming ourselves? This talk explores past and contemporary manifestations of feminist and anti-racist struggles for economic justice, human rights and an end to violence, and asks "What do we need to reclaim to make a better world?"

Kiké Roach is the Unifor National Chair in Social Justice and Democracy at Ryerson University, where she teaches courses in Social Movements and Human Rights in the Politics department and at the School of Social Work. As a civil rights lawyer, she was an advocate for accountability and reform in policing and detention centres for many years representing organizations such as the Black Action Defense Committee. A former Executive Member of the National Conference of Black Lawyers and the National Action Committee on the Status of Women, Kiké is co-author of the book Politically Speaking, on Feminism and Canadian politics.

Getting to York University, Keele Campus

On public transportation:

You can reach York's Keele campus using the TTC. From downtown Toronto, you go north on the Yonge-University subway line until you get to the York University Subway Station. A trip from downtown takes about an hour.

In addition to buses running to York from Sheppard West subway station, several bus lines, including the local Toronto Transit Commission (TTC), stop at points on Keele Campus. Please note that all local TTC transit buses now service the Pioneer Village Station. These buses include:

In a car:

You can reach York's Keele campus by car from highway 401 (via the Allen Road and Steeles) and highway 400 (via Steeles). There are entrances to the university from Keele, Jane, Steeles, and Finch. If you are coming from downtown, take the Allen Expressway to Finch Ave., go west on Finch to Keele St., and then north on Keele to the main York entrance.

The most straightforward entrance to the campus by car is from Keele St. The closest available visitor parking is the York Lanes multi-level, pay parking garage, which is just to the north of York Lanes itself. You can ask for directions for parking at the Honour Court & Welcome Centre (55 York Boulevard), which is on your left after you have entered the campus from the Keele St. entrance.
